

Due to these notable qualities and by progressing through supported training programmes, employers have offered paid employment or further training as a real positive outcome for




Ant and Dec in our school ?

- 👁️ Their teeth are very long and continue to grow so they need something hard to chew on to wear them down.



The Josephine & Jack Shack is a safe space for young people with learning disabilities aged 14-18: The 'Shack' is an accessible space where young people can get to know each other and enjoy learning together.

Josephine and Jack are life sized, anatomically correct cloth people. They are a unique learning resource and have amazing features that give young people the opportunity to explore health, sexual health and wellbeing.

Some of our year 11 & sixth form students recently took part in a series of workshops both in school on Wednesday evenings and during the holidays at Broadacre House in Newcastle.

The workshops comprised of a fun filled programme of creative learning and social opportunities. The programme was delivered by facilitators Jackie and Tom, using a range of creative methods including drama, storytelling and games as well as lot's of supporting materials appropriate for our young people.

What is your favourite thing about school?


All of the students and staff, they are a brilliant team to work with.
