An Inspector Calls!!

On the 18th and 19th of March the school had a visit from Ofsted.

Ofsted are the people who look at all of the education providers in the country and decide how good they are. They have to spend a lot of time getting evidence.

On the first day we had two inspectors. Ann Muxworthy was the lead inspector and Irene Lavelle was another inspector there to help. On the second day another inspector, Patrick Hargreaves, also came to help.

Ofsted graded the school on five different areas, these were:

Leadership and management - to make sure that Mr Sharing and the governors have good systems in place to help us do well in our learning; Behaviour and safety of pupils - to check whether staff guide students on appropriate behaviours, and whether students are taught how to be safe in and out of school;

The quality of teaching - to find out whether staff have high expectations and teach well enough so that students make good or better progress;

The achievement of pupils - to compare student's progress to other schools, and also to make sure that all students in school achieve as well as they can, regardless of their background;

The sixth form provision - to find out whether students are continuing to make good, or better, progress in their learning and are being prepared for their lives after school.

The inspectors spent two days looking through lots of paperwork, watching staff and students in lessons, and talking to students, staff at our

school, and other adults who work with us such as staff from Walker Technology College where part of our sixth form is based.

We were very pleased when the inspectors said that they had found a lot of evidence to say that we are outstanding in every area. This is now the third time we have been outstanding which is not an easy thing to do so we are extremely proud of their judgement.

In the final report the inspectors commented that "They were very impressed with students behaviour around school and said that relationships between staff and students are excellent." They said that staff also help students to be "calm and stress free." The inspectors said that teaching in school is "...outstanding and never less than good..." and that teachers and teaching assistants have "...very high expectations..." of the students.




Newcastle School Achievement Awards 2015

Staff from Sir Charles Parsons School and Claire Murphy Morgan from 'Them Wifies' have set up a new and exciting project which aims to increase student knowledge and skills in the area of Sex and Relationships.

Tutors experienced in this field have worked alongside staff delivering this flexible project designed to meet the needs of students at both the Sir Charles Parsons and Walker Technology sites. The project has run in Autumn and Spring and will end with a series of Summer workshops.

Funding to deliver the project is from the Northern Rock Foundation and everyone involved in the project agrees that this has been an extremely valuable experience for all our young people. They have gained in knowledge, developed life skills, met new people and organisations and had a great time in the process.

Feedback from our year 9 and 10 students who have taken part in the pilot so far have been extremely positive and all are looking forward to the final stage of this project. Here's what they thought:

"We have been going to a Sex and Relationship Education group with Jackie and Tom from a theatre company called 'Them Wifies'. We have enjoyed learning about men's and women's different parts of the body, what it's like to be a teenager and having lots of fun. It was fun because we got to work with different people and it was easy to talk about stuff we wouldn't normally talk about. If you didn't want to talk about something or felt daft you could listen and still find out answers to things you might have been wondering about. We really enjoyed playing the games with our friends like 'The Sun Shines On'. One time we acted out a 'Jeremy Kyle Show' and we had to give advice to a couple who were a boyfriend and girlfriend. Following the success of our Sex & Relationships



education course we have worked alongside the team from 'Them Wifies' again, this time to run a series of workshops dealing with anger management.

"In the anger management group we have learnt what anger can make you do, which is not really what you want to be doing. For example; smashing up items or damaging equipment, getting into arguments and fights. We were shown how to recognise triggers that would make you angry. Some of these are; people calling you names, bullying you or your friends and shouting at you.

We then learnt how to control anger. We learnt that being alone and counting to ten, using a stress ball or putting your favourite DVD on and locking your door were all helpful ideas to keep anger under control. We also learnt how to stay calm during an argument or disagreement. I have found this group very helpful and I am a lot calmer than I used to be. I am able to recognise triggers to being angry now and I can put what I have learnt into practise." - Jordan 10B



To find out about the Solar eclipse in science we spent some time researching eclipses that have happened in different parts of the world recently. We watched some news clips discovered that people all over the world think that it is a really special event when you get to see an eclipse in your country. We made some models and used some inflatables to help us to understand about how the earth and the moon move into alignment with the Sun to create the Solar eclipse. We also found out why different places would see different amounts of the eclipse, some places like the Faroe Islands saw a total eclipse and in Newcastle we saw a partial eclipse.

Some of the information we gathered told us that



it is not safe to look directly at the Sun, as it would damage our eyes. To help us see the eclipse safely we used some shoe boxes.

Dear Parents and Carers,

My apologies for the late publication of our spring term newsletter. This was due to our recent Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted) inspection visit which inevitably resulted in some delays in some areas of work. I am obviously pleased with the outcome and extremely proud of the students and my colleagues. I would also like to offer my genuine and sincere thanks to all parents and carers for all the support you have given the school over the years and for completing and returning the questionnaires given out at the students' annual review/Education Health Care plan meetings. Particular thanks to parents and carers who completed the on-line Parent View questionnaire and/or who talked on the telephone to an inspector.

This last inspection was the fourth time the school has been inspected since the school opened in September 1999. All these inspection judgements have been very positive. I hope this provides parents and carers with some reassurance that the school does provide a high quality of education and care and has done so over a long period. These judgements do not however, mean we always get things right, don't make mistakes or that we can't improve the provision we offer the students and the outcomes they achieve.

To emphasise this and end my note, I would like to draw your attention to the report's publication date. The inspection report was published on the Ofsted website on the 10th April 2015. It was however, sent to the school and officially became a public document on the morning of the 1st April 2015, i.e. the morning of April Fools' Day. This date will always be a useful reminder to me to keep things in perspective, even very positive Ofsted reports! As you know our mission statement as a school is: Enjoy, Learn and Achieve. That is we want every student, every single day, to enjoy their time in school, learn as much as they can and achieve as much as they are capable of. This is our ultimate aspiration. Although it is very difficult to achieve, as a team of governors and staff I can promise you we will continually strive to do so.

2x 15ml spoons boiling water

1x 5ml spoon vanilla extract

75g plain chocolate

25g milk chocolate

150g castor sugar

75g plain flour

100g margarine

2 eggs






1. Line the baking tin with grease-proof paper and pre-heat oven to 180@C/160@ fan or gas mark 6

2. Fill the saucepan one-third full of water

3. Break up all of the chocolate and place in



4. Put the bowl over the pan, making sure it doesn't touch the water, and heat gently until the chocolate starts to melt, turn down the heat so the water doesn't boil

5. When everything is melted, remove the bowl and place it onto a pan stand, give it a stir and leave to cool for a few minutes

6. Add the cocoa powder and boiling water to the small mixing bowl and stir until smooth

7. Break the eggs into the large mixing bowl and add the vanilla extract and sugar. Whisk together until smooth then whisk in the cocoa mixture

8. Add the chocolate and margarine mixture and whisk until smooth

9. Weigh then sift the flour over the mixture and fold it in gently until just combined

10. Pour the mixture into the baking tin and gently spread to the edges, and bake in the centre of the pre-heated oven for 18-20 minutes or **until only just firm in the centre**

11. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes then remove onto the cooling rack, leave grease-proof paper on

12. Once cold, remove grease-proof paper, cut into squares and serve
