


This term some of our students were given the opportunity to be one of the first schools in the UK to take part in a pilot scheme to support the Guide Dogs charity. Students have worked with staff from the charity to gain an awareness of the work that takes place. They have also taken part in the Young Guiders scheme, which teaches the students how to guide people with a visual impairment. Students have gained a level one qualification as a young guider, which means they are able to support people with a visual impairment around school and outside of school. The group have also been raising money to fund our own guide dog puppy to make a difference to someone's life. Fund raising will continue throughout the year. So far we have raised over £160 towards this cause.



back to school, some of us had a little slice of our pizzas but Tyler actually ate all of his pizza because he was really hungry.


I decided that I want to be a pizza maker one day because making the pizzas was fun.

In September we are aiming to join the North East Regional League.



Within these groups students are encouraged to experience and gain an understanding that they belong, that they matter, and that they are valued for their unique qualities. Every week Abbie, Dylan, Daniel, Rehman and Anthony have been enjoying some sensory story sessions. As well as hearing the story, the students explore objects relating to the story along with sounds and music. The same story is repeated over several weeks, with objects being presented at particular points as well as related tastes and smells. The idea behind this is that the students will start to anticipate events. Over the weeks extra props and textures are added to encourage students to reach out, hold and pass unfamiliar objects. The most recent story that the students have been enjoying is 'Sheldon Snail's Sunbathing Session' by Pete Wells. This story, along with others, is available by visiting the Portland Academy website, or by 'Googling' Pete Wells sensory stories. Here you can find a copy of the story along with suggested props and a PowerPoint presentation with sound effects, to run along side. 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


