

'The Friends of Sir Charles Parsons School' have had an extremely successful year in terms of fundraising, grant donations and raising the profile of our school. Events have been well attended by our supporters - staff, students, parents, carers, friends and the wider community. Our Friends of .. Facebook page has now almost 200 'likes' which enables even more people to keep up to date with our current events and fundraising efforts.

'The Friends of...' have raised £43,013.98 this year, which is a 58% increase on our first year as a registered charities total. We have held eight events this year continuing with and introducing new initiatives such as GNR, school photo day, Ragbin recycling as well as holding stalls at an external church fair.

We have also benefited hugely from grants awarded by The Big lottery, The Wooden Spoon Children's Charity, The Chronicle's Sunshine Fund, Sir Janes Knott Trust, The Rothley Trust, RW Mann Trust and Community Foundation. This has enabled us to fund the first five of our desired nine phases of outdoor play equipment to be installed this year and early 2018.

Our students now benefit from access to an outdoor gym, timber trim trail, wheelchair accessible roundabout, zip wire and basket swing. Funding and orders are now in place for the sixth and seventh phase due to commence in February with the installation of a wheelchair accessible swing, two standard swings and the sensory area panels. Plans are underway to fund the remaining two phases, which are a bespoke accessible tower structure and a tyre park. It is estimated these two areas will cost around £24,000to purchase and have installed.

Fundraising and bids for grants for our outdoor play equipment will remain our main initiative in 2018. However, as agreed by all of our stakeholders, we will continue to support the provision of our residential experiences and that of providing specialist equipment and resources for our students.

Fundraising events in the pipeline include tentative plans for a 'Coast to Coast' cycle ride over two days sometime in the second half of the Spring term 2018, more information will follow in January. Longer term plans include a 'Peak to Peak Challenge' and for both of these initiatives we would welcome any participant offers from our supporters!

We have also secured an increased number of places for the charity in the 2018 main Great North Run and mini and junior runs.

One area we continue to find challenging is having sufficient volunteers to help at our bigger events such as our Winter, Spring and Summer coffee mornings. Again, FOSCPs would welcome any volunteers of help at such events. Please get in touch with the school office who will direct you to the appropriate committee members for more information.



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
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We had a special treat with food technology and art when we designed and made a gingerbread houses.






Tahir, 10B Courtney and Connor, 11W have been studying GCSE Art via a

Over the last term during literacy lessons Sixth Form students have been preparing acts to perform in '6th Form's Got Talent'. The project was around students developing social communication skills as well as increasing confidence in expressing personal opinions.

The students could choose to form a group act or to work as a solo performer. Over the weeks students have researched TV talent shows from around the world to compare acts and formats. Students then practised their acts over a series of weeks, and each week received feedback recorded on a critique sheet from their peers.

The feedback process was very important in developing students self awareness and helped them to develop their practical skills further. For example the basketball act learnt that counting through the act helped them to synchronise. Students from Years 7, 10 and 11 formed the audience for the final show, with selected Sixth Form staff and students forming the judging panel.



Letter from the Head




Dear Parents, & Carers,
