
Mrs DiLeonardo and Mrs Gullon were very happy to discover they could fit into a ride designed for under tens when they went on the frog hopper with Ellie.

They use a range of standard equipment which they can operate through the use of various switches as well as some specialised equipment. This allows them to be able to develop their cooking and independence skills as well as numeracy and literacy. At the end of each session the students evaluate their work on texture appearance, aroma and taste.





I also began telling stories that were very convincing, I have a small scar on my hand and I would tell people I had rolled out of bed onto a potato peeler or that I kept penguins in the bath at home that I had stolen from Flamingo land. In year eight I was still guite shy and didn't like to speak up in class to answer questions, so Christine gave me an 'attention seeker'. The idea was I would press it with my head and a blue light would flash and make a noise, a bit like a police car pulling up. Around this time I got my laptop which I loved as it meant I could do my work independently.

When Sally Cooper left I moved to Mrs DiLeonardo's class, I liked Mrs D but the classroom was tiny and was usually a right mess. I have enjoyed residential visits to Calvert Trust in Keswick and Keilder. I met some very interesting people and got to do some really exciting things like 'The King Swing' in Keswick, it went so fast I thought my head had come off! Night time hikes in the rain and dark, getting stuck in the mud, canoeing on the lake and potholing in underground caves. I will never forget.

I have had lots of work experience opportunities both in and out of school. My favourite was at Asda Byker, where I worked in the photo shop, telling people how to use the printer and things. Three years ago I became a member of the Power Chair Football team with my friends Ryan, Ghufranullah, Jordan, Dan, my brother Shehab and our newest member, Darian.

Andrew is our coach, Sarah and Sarah are the cheerleaders. We have trained hard and now play over at Percy Hedley along with other teams.
