Some parents and carers have benefitted from installing the app 'ScreenTime' on mobile devices and

tablets. This app allows you to limit the amount of time the user can spend on a device, as well as monitoring the sites or apps which are being accessed.

## **Forest School**

Sir Charles Parsons School are involved in a research project with Newcastle University and Scotswood Natural Community Garden, exploring the benefits of nature and being outdoors on emotional wellbeing and engagement in education. Students attend weekly sessions, where they follow Forest School principles to engage successfully with the environment.

Every Friday we go to Forest School in Scotswood with Mrs Whincup, Tom and Stephen. When we get to Forest School, Harriet, the leader goes over the rules with us about looking after nature. We all have to wear warm clothes and sensible footwear as we are outside all day. We play some mini games when we get there to warm up like 'tag', 'stuck in the mud' and 'Eagle Eyes.' Eagle eyes is a game where when someone is on you are standing with sticks around you and you say "eagle eye are closing for ... 9.8.7.6.5.4.3.2,1" seconds then you have to try and make it to that person and tap their hand and say your name then you have to hide before the person say eagle eyes are opening. It's a lot like hide and seek. We do something called 'My Project' we can choose anything from wood carving, making a fire, building dens and putting a hammock up. I chose to make a fire and Demi made Christmas decorations from clay. We have to work together when we do the projects and when we tidy up at the end of the day. Demi says it's good practice for when she goes camping next April. I think it is good for learning new skills that might help when you go walking or camping.





'I liked it when the Grinch went to the little girls house for Christmas Dinner' Natasha 'I liked it. It's a good film for all the family to enjoy' Abbie



They have learnt many new skills including how to get off their bikes while moving and how to move on their bikes safely, in a very small area. All students involved now how a good awareness of how to be safe on their bikes, but also the correct checks to do before taking their bikes out on a ride. The students were extremely keen to learn new skills and Adam and Melissa were very impressed with their enthusiasm and ability to listen to instructions. Well done to the Year 11 students involved Dylan, Richard, Leon, Paul, Tahir, Jack and Kierian.



Kierian said 'On Wednesday mornings Melissa and Adam from British Cycling have been coming to school to run a cycling course. They have shown us different cycling styles and have brought different types of bikes along for us to use. We have learnt about mountain biking and how to ride up and down hills and around cones at top speed. There was speedway cycling where it is important to keep your body pushed forward and your back straight. We also learned about BMX and road cycling. I couldn't ride a bike very well before doing this course but now I am much more confident and brave when I ride a bike.
