For some students who joined us just before, or since Covid, this term has been the first time they have been able to access the pool in over 18 months. One of these students is Connor. In September he was reluctant to even go into the pool, now, in such a short time, he has developed a good body position in the water and is able to kick his legs efficiently. Better than that though, he often comes back to class saying how much he enjoyed his lesson

In October we launched our 'After School and Wraparound provision.

SCP's Breakfast club runs Monday to Friday and is situated in our school's 'Thrive' room. Sessions are from 7.45am until the start of the school day (8.50am). Breakfast options such as toast, cereal and yoghurts are provided. The club is run by school staff who support the students to transition to their pastoral classes when the club finishes.

Your child needs to be dropped off at school between 7.45am and 8am to access this provision.

The standard charge for this provision is £3 per session.

'Wraparound After School Club' runs Monday to Thursday. Students accessing additional nights (other than their one free after school club) will be able to access the range of clubs on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights.

On Monday nights the wraparound offers relaxed activities based in the Thrive room. A healthy snack/light tea is also provided.

The standard charge for this provision is £8 per session.

Transport (if required) is available to a drop off point in the West of the city (Balloon Pub carpark) on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights at a cost of £3 per trip.

Student in Year 9 have been taking part in a new project in their music lessons. Supported by Music Hubs in Newcastle, North Tyneside and Northumberland, special schools throughout the area have been working with students in their school to

develop use of music technology in the classroom. Students at Sir Charles Parson worked in pastoral groups to learn how to use garage band to compose their own music on the iPad. They then created a film using 'iMovie' and added their music as the soundtrack. The movies were then shared and will be viewed in a watch party which will be seen by all the schools involved in the project.

Students have enjoyed using these Apps on the iPad and both apps are available free on iPads so students can use them at home too.

In music we've been doing about iPads and how to make a movie with music as part of a competition. We have been doing it on 'Garage Band' which is an app where you can just make music with different sounds which are already in the app. We also used iMovie and then we put the sounds off 'Garage Band' and put it on to 'iMovie' so we can see the movie and the music together.

We were telling a story in the video called 'My Mates' which was about a picnic with your friends. Ours happened with somebody looking really sad and one person came over and said come on, lets go on a walk, then all the other people said come on there's a picnic going on over here. 

In our History lessons we have been learning about World War II. The war was on from 1939 - 1945 because Hitler from Germany wanted to take over other countries in the world starting with Poland.

Then we learned about Remembrance Day and about Poppies, which are to remember the soldiers who died. Everybody made poppies. We collected all the poppies and made a big display with a Monument in reception.

We sold Poppies to other classes as well as bands, pencils and rubbers and reflectors to raise money for the Royal British Legion.

Everybody was guiet for two minutes on the 11th of November at 11 o'clock to think about the soldiers who died.

Sixth Form Students have continued to work on their 'customer service and catering skills' this term when they have prepared and sold meals to our staff

during Thursday's Enterprise. During the first half term they made hot breakfast sandwiches to order before moving onto making a variety of soups and sandwiches.

"On Thursdays we make food to sell for our Enterprise lessons. First we collect in the orders which staff leave at the office and the staffroom with their payments. Then we make tally charts to show how much of each item we need so we don't waste food. When we decided to change the menu to soup and sandwiches we voted on filling types to offer and we decided that the two sandwiches we sell each week would be tuna mayonnaise and cheese savoury, we found a good recipe for the cheese savoury mix which has mustard, red pepper and sweet paprika in it and makes a very tasty filling. Each week we have made different flavoured soups. When all the orders are complete we count the money and do the sums to see if we have made a profit or not. Later on in the afternoon we do a 'stock take' and make the shopping list for the next week. We have asked what people thought about the food and we got lots of positive feedback. 
mixed together well.

#### Emma - Support assistant


- I am from Leeds

Students across year 10 and 11 have started their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award this year. The 'D of E' award is aimed at young people between the age of 14 and 25. Participants aim to complete activities in four different categories, Volunteering, Skill, Physical and Expedition.

Our students have been working very hard on their volunteering and physical sections since September. For volunteering the students decided that they would like to do something to help their local community and environment. We have completed a range of tasks around our school grounds such as, litter picking, making bird feeders and a bird house, and clearing and prepping the allotment area of school. Most recently the students have ventured outside of school to complete litter picks in a local park. They have all worked incredibly hard and have braved all weathers.

For the physical section they decided that they wanted to do something that would raise their heart rate but be fun at the same time. We have been exploring a wide variety of team games such as Blob Tag, Zombie Tag, Dodgeball and Ultimate Frisbee.

After the New Year students will begin their skill section where they will get the opportunity to practice a range of activities that will help them during their summer expedition. Activities such as map reading and navigation, pitching tents, camp cooking and some first aid.





Forest School takes place in a woodland or natural wooded environment to support the development of a relationship between the learner and the natural world. There are many advantages of spending time in woodland areas. Mature trees allow for lots of play opportunities such as tree swings, tree climbing, and natural shelter from wind, rain and sun. Children are able to find their own kindling and firewood and be creative using natural materials. At forest school we make good use of the resources that we find such as logs, leaves and rocks. We call these "loose parts". A pile of Autumn leaves can be thrown in the air, or used to hide a friend. A stick can be used to play limbo or crafted into marshmallow skewers.

At our Forest School we are lucky to have an abundance of wildlife so close to school. We see grey squirrels, woodpeckers, newts and frogs as well as a huge array of insects.

This term we had some unexpected visitors to our Forest School area. The fire brigade were called when a member of the public spotted a rather large fire burning in the small woodland adjacent to our school that our students use on Mondays for Forest School. It appears that someone else had been exploring our area, but didn't know how to do this safely. The fire brigade were not able to get their fire engine close to the area but luckily Tom, who runs our sessions was still in school and led them around. Because they were unable to use their hose to extinguish the blaze, the fire crew opted to use handheld water sieves. The devices looked much like a carrier bag with lots of holes in the bottom. They were able to get there guickly before all their water drained away. Luckily the damage caused was minimal and should not affect future sessions. Storm Arwen and Storm Barra have also taken their toll on the woodland, but hopefully we will still have some trees to climb in the new year!




