With our school mission always in mind, 'maximizing opportunities; enriching lives' we have yet again successfully worked with year 11, 12 and 13 students to encourage and develop their work experience skills. We have had the pleasure of working with a variety of companies and dedicated mentors, employers and educational staff to provide safe establishments for our students to learn new skills in the world of work. The students not only gained work experience skills but have had the opportunity to grow in confidence, meet new people, and have a sense of responsibility and independence. This year we have worked with Allingtons Kia in Ashington, Liberdade, Monkchester Nursery, St Anthony of Padua, Food Works, Vane Art Gallery, Costa Coffee, Eldon Leisure, Hadrian School, and the Baltic. We also work with Project Choice who have created some fantastic opportunities for our year 12 and 13 students. They are a 'work based programme' who equip young people with learning difficulties with the social and work-based skills needed to enable them to understand the pathway to employment'. Through project choice there is the possibility of students moving on into internships and apprenticeships. At the end of their school life here at Sir Charles Parsons, students will have a great deal of knowledge behind them to support them in entering the world of work. Project Choice have provided placements such as Freeman Hospital Sterile Services, Linen Services and Hotel Services and QE Hospital Breast and Bowel Screen Department and Medical Records and finally Bensham Hospital Booking Department. We look forward to carrying on the journey.

We went to the circus that was at Blaydon. We left school early to get there and travelled on the school minibus. When we got to the circus we parked the minibus then we walked to the tent. It was



We have also been working with lots of other schools and organisations, sharing ideas and looking at ways we can all improve and continue to develop excellent opportunities and experiences for young people with special educational needs across the region. This has already had an impact on the work experience and work based learning programmes available to year 11 and 6th form and we are planning many more curriculum developments for the next school year.

While it has been a successful and productive year for us, education as a whole is finding things very difficult. Everyone is aware of the funding crisis across education and other public sector services and the huge impact this is having, particularly on the most vulnerable, including young people with special educational needs.

'Extra's' such as specialist outdoor equipment, seating, accessible bikes and outdoor areas, residential opportunities and visits outside of school. However we are also aware of the very big impact that these sites can have on young people's self esteem and mental health. There has been much press about young people becoming obsessed with social media, with around 5% of teenagers thought to be 'addicted' to social media. There is a wealth of information available on the internet to support parents and carers to talk to their young people about the use of technology and their presence online. National Online Safety.com have produced a series of information leaflets about general use and more specific games and apps.
