Threat levels

There are 5 potential levels of threat across the country :

- low an attack is highly unlikely
- moderate an attack is possible but not likely
- substantial an attack is likely
- severe an attack is highly likely
- critical an attack is highly likely in the near future

What are British Values?

Extremism is defined as a vocal or active opposition to British values. British values are:

- Democracy
- Rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect
- Tolerance of other faiths & beliefs

We have a legal obligation to teach our students about these values but sometimes they come under a different name, such as Citizenship or SMSC (spiritual, moral, social and cultural).

Many of the British values listed by the DfE aren't easily "taught" -They come from the culture of our school and need to be lived through our ethos and values.

In addition to addressing British values across all elements of our school life, we address relevant topics within our PSHE curriculum. The following topics are delivered to these year groups during PSHE lessons, which help pupils to understand British values:

Year 7

My family and Relationships Caring for others Bullying Safety in the community

Year 8

Economic wellbeing Emotional wellbeing Relationship and sex education

Year 9

Rules, rights and responsibilities Relationships

Bullying, racism and prejudice

Year 10

Personal identify and self-awareness Relationship and sex education Recognising risks and online safety

Year 11

Prejudice and discrimination Choice and risk: making good choices Relationship and sex education

6th form

Prejudice and discrimination Choice and risk: making informed choices Relationship and sex education

What about online safety?

- The school will work with the LA, DFE and the Internet Service Provider to ensure systems to protect students are reviewed and improved.
- If staff or students discover an unsuitable site, it must be reported to the e-Safety Coordinator.
- Senior staff will ensure that regular checks are made to ensure that the filtering methods selected are appropriate, effective and reasonable.

During computing lessons, students will be taught:

Using search engines to access information from a range of websites:

Students should be taught what internet use is acceptable and what to do if they access material they are uncomfortable with.

Communicating ideas within chat rooms or online forums:

Only chat rooms dedicated to educational use and that are moderated should be used. Access to other social networking sites should be blocked. Students should never give out personal information.

What to do if you are concerned about extremism at Sir Charles Parsons School?

If you have any doubts as to whether something you have seen or heard has the potential for being linked with extremism or radicalisation, pass it on information to one of our designated safeguard leads (DSLs). They will advise on how to pursue this matter.

PREVENT

Prevent is part of the Government's counter-terrorism strategy . It is designed to safeguard vulnerable people and communities from the threat of radicalisation.

There are different types of terrorism. The most common types are religious fundamentalism, farright/white supremacy and LASIT (Leftist, Anarchy, Single-Issue Terrorism).

Under the government's Prevent Duty, all public sector agencies have a responsibility to ensure their staff have a good understanding of Prevent and their responsibilities towards individuals and the families who they are working with.
